WELCOME

We welcome new students who have enrolled recently. We trust your time at Pasadena will be enjoyable and profitable.

HONOURS

Students receive recognition for their achievements, contributions and participation through our Special Effort Awards programme. In keeping with the school's philosophy and mission statement, we further recognise those students who participate, contribute and achieve in the full range of activities available at Pasadena through our Honours Award programme.

To qualify, students must have consistently displayed the standards as described in the Pasadena Code (see Page 17) and receive a minimum of 10 awards as follows:

2 from Specialist Courses/ Programmes; 2 from Cultural or Arts Activities; 2 for Sport /HPWB Physical; 2 from Classroom Teacher for class work and 2 others. 1 for class HPWB Physical for First Honours Only. The 2 others must be from different categories.

Students who believe they have qualified, apply to the Principal with their awards. If the Principal is satisfied the student has the required awards the student receives an Application Form.

The Applicant must complete a self evaluation - if the Applicant believes he or she has not consistently met any of the standards described in the Pasadena Code, the Applicant should mark the Application Form accordingly and sign.

The Application Form must be taken to each of the following

Classroom Teacher

The Syndicate Manager

Specialist Teachers the Student is Currently Working With

If a teacher believes the Applicant has not consistently met any of the standards described in the Pasadena Code, the teacher will explain this to the Applicant and mark the Application Form accordingly. When the Applicant has met with all teachers, the Application Form should be returned to the Principal.

If the Applicant's self evaluation shows and all the teachers have been satisfied the student has consistently displayed the standards as described in the Pasadena Code, the Application is taken to the next full Staff meeting for final approval.

The student will be presented with the Honours Badge and Certificate at the next Friday Assembly.

If the Applicant's self evaluation shows or if any of the teachers have not been satisfied with the student's performance and have marked the Application Form, the Principal will discuss the matter with the student and set a date one terms hence when the student can reapply.

During their time at Pasadena, students may qualify for and receive more than 1 Honours Award.

For significant or repeated breaches of the Pasadena Code, a student may have their Honours Status removed. A student who has had Honours Status removed is entitled to earn 10 new awards and reapply.

HIROSHIMA EXCHANGE

As you may already know, the Pasadena visit to Hiroshima as part of our Exchange Programme with Hiroshima High School Junior High School due to be happening at this time, has been postponed until September because of the SARS virus.

Our travel plans have us going via Singapore, a SARS 'hot spot'. This coupled with the Singapore Airlines significant reduction in flights, including flights to Hiroshima, gave us no option but to postpone.

Last week, Hiroshima High School and Junior High School received a directive from the Prefecture Government that they were to suspend all international excursions and exchanges until further notice!

This was a bombshell. The Junior High School and High School have a total of four overseas trips each year, plus our exchange. This is a government directive and although the school is private, they do receive considerable government funding and are bound by government directive and regulation.

In the light of this new circumstance, we have decided a further and indefinite postponement was not appropriate and reluctantly, have agreed to cancel this year's exchange completely.

A bitter disappointment for those selected, but one that was beyond our control.

JUNIOR SUMMIT CAMP

For the same reasons as described above, the 2003 Junior Summit Camp has also been cancelled.

Again, a bitter disappointment for those planning to participate.

BOYS' EDUCATION

In recent times, there has been considerable research and a lot of discussion about boys and education and boys and school. As a school, we have been reading this research and attending courses as we strive to provide the best opportunity for all our students. We subscribe to a number of professional publications that include articles on boys and education, boys and school and parenting. NZ magazine, *Parenting with Confidence*, has kindly given us permission to print extracts from their Autumn 2001 publication that we think may prove helpful for parents.

The first of 2 extracts from "Hot Tips on Raising Boys" by Ian Grant - 'Parenting with Confidence' Autumn 2001.

BOYS-A QUICK FIRE OVERVIEW

The advance of feminism has successfully educated society that a girl's brain is as good as a boy's brain. Unfortunately, many have therefore assumed that this means girls' brains are the same as boys' brains. Political correctness has tried to throw all the differences into a pot, asserting sameness, rather than celebrating the different qualities that boys and girls bring to a family or school.

Like it or not, many factors—mental, physical and emotional—separate girls from boys, making boys unique 'animals' to have around. Boys are special—they're 'wired' differently to girls—from their dandruff to their chillblains.

BOYS ARE NOT USUALLY TALKATIVE OR FEELINGS BASED

Boys generally use concrete reasoning to work through aspects of life. Their brain 'clicks' with concepts about movement, space and objects. Give a boy a toy and he doesn't just play with it; he will attempt to figure out what makes it tick. This, ladies, is the reason why your hubby won't ready DIY instruction manuals!

BOYS ARE COMPETITIVE

This is part of a male's biological make-up. Because of a hormone called testosterone, boys—even young ones—revel in competition. Give a group of boys a cricket bat and a ball at the beach, then stand back and watch a game breakout, with fully adhered to rules and rewards.

Girls will stop a game if there is the threat of a relationship breakdown; however to boys, it is the game that is more important.

BOYS ARE RISK TAKERS

The more testosterone a boy has, the more of a risk taker he will be. That's why boys discover when crossing a bridge that you can also crawl along it, upside down, on the pipes underneath.

This is not to say your girls will show none of the above behaviours, but nine times out of ten the boys will predictably operate from this set of imperatives.

The biological make-up of boys, which leads to risk-taking is one of the reasons that more die young, drop out of school and get into crime.

SCHOOL TELEPHONE

The requirements of the information age are making ever increasing demands on our telephone system. in school grounds during school hours


And that Board members, staff members and personnel involved in school activities, will not interact with a student while smoking.

Staff from Auckland Healthcare Services National Audiology Centre will be at Pasadena on Tuesday 4 June to conduct Hearing and Vision Testing.


